HISTORY BATTLEFIELDS TOUR

As the sun set on Tuesday evening, some of Year 9 were settling into their Boarders' supper ahead of an early night and an even earlier start! The sun was still asleep when most of the Year 9 group gathered to catch our coach to head off to the continent. By 8:30am, we made it, through snow and rain to Folkestone and then onwards to France and Belgium.

We arrived in snowy France and Belgium and set off and soon we were making our first stops, at Lijssenthoek Cemetery, some German trenches at Bayernwald, Essex Farm cemetery famous for where the poet John McCrae worked as a surgeon and Canada Farm cemetery, where a relative of Mr Browning was buried. At Lijssenthoek cemetery, there were a couple of centimetres of snow on the around which made it look particularly beautiful. From there we were on the coach and off to the hostel for dinner and to drop off our luggage. After dinner, we had some time to ourselves in the Games Room and then it was lights out, after a very cold and long day.

On Day 2, following breakfast and making our day's packed lunch, we made our way to one of Ypres' famous chocolate shops, which was amazing!

After we filled our bags with chocolate and sweets, we were off to the main museum in the centre of Ypres, where we could find out lots about the war. The rest of the day was a whirlwind of visits: First to the museum at Hooge Crater, which was great. Then to the Sanctuary Wood Museum, where we could explore the fantastic, muddy, wet trenches. Everyone 'loved' exploring the tunnels and trenches, though it was particularly brilliant when it began to rain really heavily, and we soon realised how tough it must have been in the trenches deep in a cold, wet winter. After lunch, we made our way to two different cemeteries.

Firstly, we went to Tyne Cot cemetery where everyone was astonished by the size of this British cemetery. It is the biggest in the world. We laid a cross of remembrance for a Woolverstonian fallen soldier, Private George Cattermole. Finally, we went to Langemark to the German cemetery where the difference between the two sides was interestina and surprising. The Germans were not allowed as much space as the Allies resulting in very different looks; the gravestones were stone slabs laid down on the ground with a mass grave of 30,000 men.

After heading back to the hostel for dinner, we were back on the coach to Ypres where we participated in the Menin Gate Last Post Ceremony. It starts at 8pm every night, all through the year - even during the Covid lockdowns. After some



buglers played the Last Post, Hettie and Jude laid a wreath on behalf of the school. Though quick, the ceremony was very serious and thought-provoking. We had some free time in groups in Ypres main square and then back on the coach to the hostel for bed and lights out.

Wake up call was 7:15, though some of us were surprisingly up earlier! After breakfast, we cleaned our rooms and packed and we were off for our final part of the trip to the Somme, 2 hours away in France. It was 'blowing a hooley'! We had a tour of the Newfoundland Memorial including going into the preserved trenches. From there we made our way to Lochnagar Crater, but it was so windy we couldn't risk wandering around the crater



in case we got blown over the edge. We were warned it would be big, but we were amazed at how deep and wide it was. Our final stop was Thiepval memorial which was enormous. The memorial has almost 75,000 names on it for the missing British soldiers from the Battle of the Somme. Then back on the coach for the start of the trip home!

What an amazing trip. To come here makes it all so real. When we learn about the war in class, it is difficult to comprehend the scale of it all. A really memorable experience where at times it was thought-provoking and sad, but at other times it was definitely fun!
