SYNOPSIS.

ACT I.

Kilian, a peasant, has defeated Max, a crack shot, at a shooting contest, bringing disgrace upon him. Kilian and the villagers mock and tease Max at his defeat. Cuno, the Head-ranger, has been worried about Max's shooting of late; for on the next day, an old custom decrees that Max must fire a trial shot before Prince Ottokar, on which depends his eventual succession to Head-ranger and winning his bride, Agathe.

Caspar, a disciple of the Black Huntsman, Zamiel, approaches Max, and hands him his gun. He points to an eagle high in the sky and tells him to shoot. The eagle falls dead—a wonderful shot. Caspar informs him that he shot with a magic bullet, for his bullets always hit whatever target he wills. Caspar tempts Max to meet him in the Wolf's Glen at midnight where they will mould the bullets. Max in despair accepts

ACT II.

Caspar's advice to use magic bullets at the shooting trial next day.

Annie is trying to dispel the forebodings of Agathe on the eve of her wedding, but with little success. Max, in an excitable mood, comes in to tell Agathe he has shot a stag in the Wolf's Glen, and makes excuses to hurry away to meet Caspar. The girls vainly try to warn him against it.

In the Wolf's Glen Zamiel appears while Caspar is preparing the magic rites for the moulding of the bullets. Soon after Max arrives, the seven magic bullets are cast.

ACT III.

Annie and the bridesmaids come to greet Agathe on her wedding day, wishing her happiness, and present her with gifts. Annie brings in the wedding bouquet; Agathe opens the box and to her horror finds a wreath, which she takes for an evil omen.

The shooting trial begins before Prince Ottokar, Caspar and the villagers. Max has only one bullet left (which Zamiel can direct at will). The Prince gives him his target, a dove, and gives the order to shoot, At that moment Agathe appears and calls out, but too late: Caspar falls fatally wounded. Zamiel has no power over Max as he did not come to the Glen of his own free will but was tempted by Caspar. Agathe had only swooned; Max confesses to the Prince that he had been enticed by Caspar into the Wolf's Glen and this action results in his banishment. Only the intercession of the Hermit wins the Prince's forgiveness; everyone is jubilant that all has turned out for the best.
