## English Department

- 1. The aims of the department is to maximise each student's control over language and its uses, both in their ability to comprehend what is being said and written down, also in what they say and write, thus optimising the responsibility they may take for themselves while encouraging a critical and evaluative consciousness.
- The main principle of the department derives from the belief in the importance of the study of language and literature in the more toward autonomy and that these are experienced in an atmosphere of trust, unselfishness and with a spirit of co-operation.

12. The department is in the process of extending mixed ability teaching in co-operation with the Special Needs Department.
